Paraphrasing in Literature to Support Reading Comprehension

#### **Tips**

- Define and remind students what it means to paraphrase vs summarize. Additionally, make sure that students understand figurative language such as simile, metaphor, and personification.
- Encourage students to read the passages aloud and more than once to boost comprehension and oral reading fluency.
- Make sure that students cycle back to the unknown words and add any that were discussed or debated.

#### **Extensions**

- Work towards a gradual release of responsibility. Complete a few paraphrases together and then begin to require more independence with the skill.
